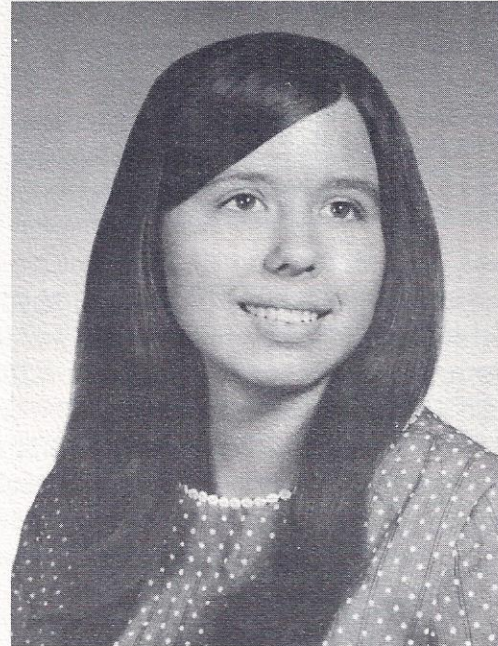
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CHRIST J. HAHN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

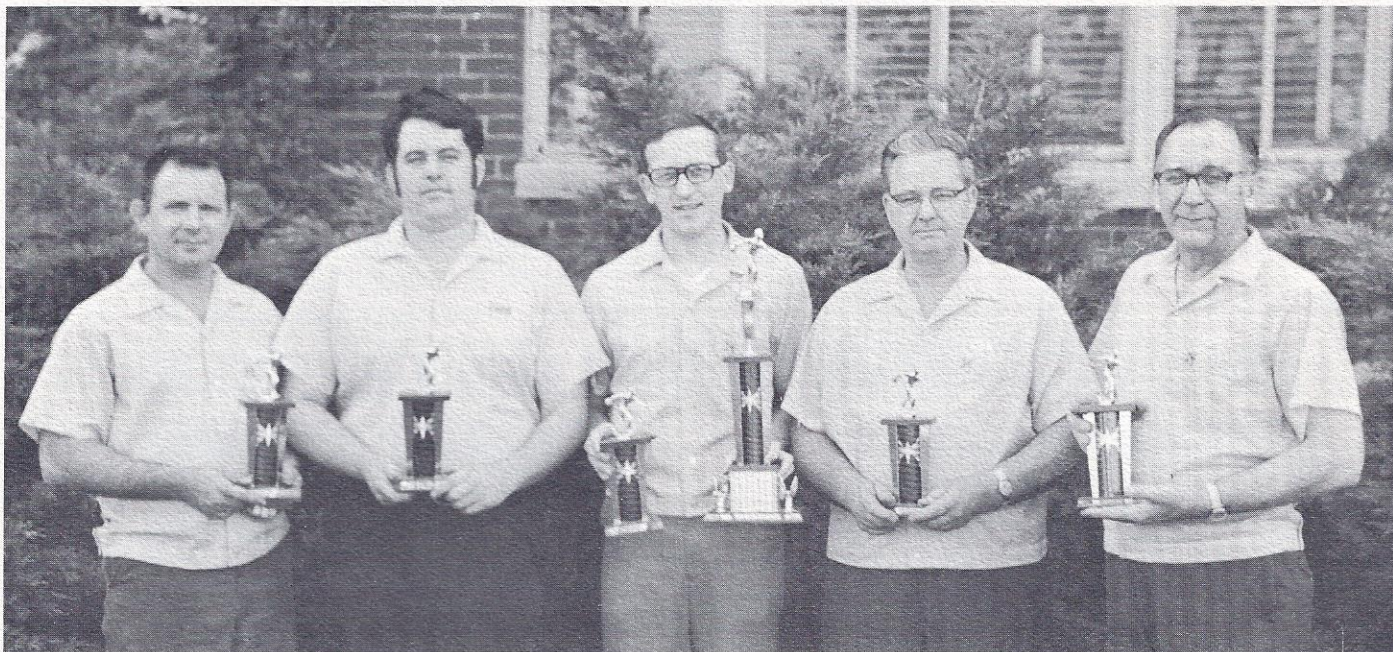

For instance, if your 19th birthday is in May, you will be without coverage until you are properly enrolled in September. This could prove to be a very critical period for you. Check on "effective dates" too. Maybe by pre-paying, you can initiate coverage earlier.

It sounds like medical health insurance is a law. Not so. But, rest assured, an acute illness, an auto accident, or even a bad fall at home can put you in the hospital. This can be a catastrophe to your savings account, and jeopardize your entire financial structure, as well as your parents.

So, while you still have time, check into some insurance programs around town, on campus, and be ready for your 19th and eliminate the panic in your household. Plan ahead.
