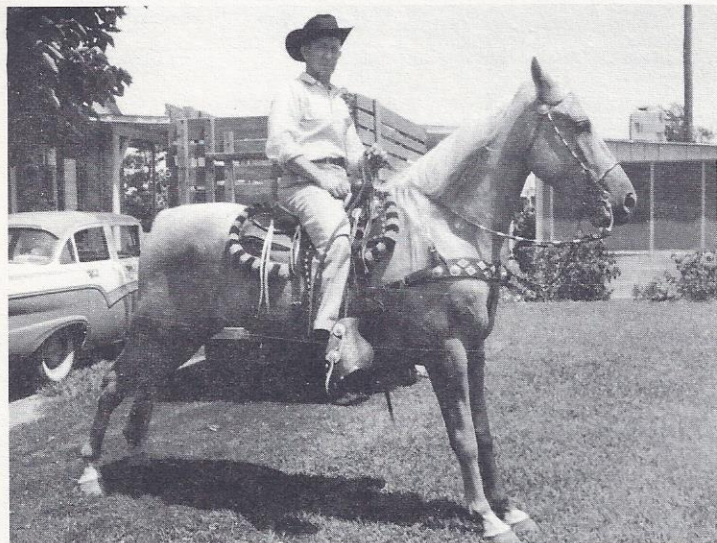


ENTHUSIASM REIGNS SUPREME

UNITED FUND DRIVE.....

The United Fund will be starting their annual kick-off drive soon. This drive involves the total community. You are a key citizen of our community, and to have a successful drive we must have total community involvement.

Below is a letter dealing specifically with United Fund agencies and employees at Hahn, Inc.

During 1970 at least 35 Hahn employees and their families received services from one or more of the 26 local United Fund agencies. Because employment statistics are not compiled by some agencies this does not include those whose sons and daughters are members of the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Red Cross, Y.M.C.A., or who received services from the four Warrick County United Fund agencies. Nor does it include the entire community benefits received from the Health Planning Council and Community Council, or the many who were in some way directly served by the United Fund staff. Counting all of the agencies for which employment statistics are not available it would be conservative to estimate that 35 represents only about one third of all the Hahn employees and families who received services from United Fund agencies.

In last year's drive, Hahn employees pledged \$3,906.00 to the Fund. Services of Fund agencies are for all of the people of the community, if or when they want and need them.

It costs \$11.71 for one home visit by a Public Health Nursing Association Nurse; last year PHNA nurses went to the homes of six Hahn employees. It costs the Family and Children's Service \$18.35 for a client to be interviewed for one hour by a caseworker, and \$621.00 for interviews and studies concerning

an adoption; three Hahn employees went to Family and Children's Service last year. It annually costs the local Boy Scout Council \$22.00 for every boy in the Scouts.

The list is as long as that of the agencies; eight Hahn families received some kind of service from the Y.W.C.A., four from the Rehabilitation Center, two from St. Vincent's Day Care Center, eleven from Planned Parenthood, and one from Salvation Army.

Last year the twenty-six local United Fund agencies provided services to 133,179 clients. This involves some duplication in that many of these clients received services from two or more agencies.

All pledges to the United Fund of Southwestern Indiana are solicited from workers and residents of Vanderburgh and Warrick counties. Many of the clients of United Fund agencies are from neither of these counties. A crippled child can't be denied the chance to learn to walk just because he lives in the next county. More than 8% of the total operating budgets of the Vanderburgh and Warrick counties United Fund participating agencies went last year to providing services for residents of neither of the two counties. This is partially offset by employees of Hahn and other Vanderburgh-Warrick counties industries who make their pledges to the United Fund of Southwestern Indiana.

Without the United Fund the families of 35 Hahn employees and 133,179 people in the tri-state area would not be able to receive all of the necessary agency services.

THE CHRISTMAS CLUB IS BACK.....

An interest bearing Christmas Club savings plan will be available to all Hahn employees for next year. Details are being worked out with Citizens National Bank. Further information will be available in the near future.

HAHN BLOOD BANK.....

Hahn employees have the opportunity to establish a blood bank at Deaconess Hospital. To make this plan work, we need blood donors, to build and keep the blood reserve high so it will be available when it is needed.

If and when the need arises, an employee or a member of their family, can draw the needed blood from the bank at no charge. Several employees in the past, would have benefited greatly if a plan of this type had been available at the time.

The Chairman of the Hahn Blood Bank is Rose Roehm, our plant nurse, and you can contact her if further information is needed.

1. Do not eat a heavy meal before giving blood.
2. If you are on any antibiotics or anti-coagulants, you can not give blood.
3. When the need arises for you to use the blood bank, let the plant nurse know, she will take care of having the blood transferred from Hahn's account to the patient's account.
